2. Objectives of the Practice:

4. The Practice:

2. Objectives of the Practice:

- 4. The institute provides a platform for youth engagement in constructive activities that benefit society, fostering a sense of civic duty and active citizenship from a young age.
- 5. The college emphasizes the development of students' skills through hands-on participation in community projects.
- 6. The institute plays a crucial role in developing leadership qualities among cadets through training programs, camps, and leadership exercises.

3. The Context:

The institute play crucial role in shaping students into responsible citizens who are aware of societal issues and are actively engaged in addressing them. These not only focus on skill development but also emphasize the importance of service towards the nation and community. The institute organizes awareness, upliftment, and development programs throughout the year with the aim of serving society. This includes conducting camps where student volunteers work closely with rural communities to understand and address their issues. Additionally, activities such as yoga training, observance of special days, and NSS week programs are part of their initiatives. Students are prepared for national service, both in terms of internal security and

5. Evidence of Success:
